Parenting Young Children

GOSPEL REMINDERS

- * Your child is an interpreter. Human beings made in the image of God do not live life based on the facts of their experience but based on their interpretation of the facts.
- * Your child is a worshiper. Worship is your child's identity before it's ever their activity. Something will always lay claim to the rulership of your child's heart.
- * Your child doesn't just need behavior management; they need worship realignment if they're ever going to willingly submit to, and joyfully obey, the Lord.
- * Your child needs to realize they have been born into a world of authority. God makes his invisible authority visible in the life of children by sending parents of authority to represent that authority.
- * Your child needs to understand and experience that the One who sits on the throne of the universe is the definition of love.

SESSION ONE

Parenting Young Children

KEY VERSE

Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.

Ephesians 6:4

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- I. What has laid claim to the rulership of your heart since becoming a parent? How has raising sinful children in a fallen world exposed idols that you worship, perhaps previously unknown?
- 2. How can you use your identity as a worshipper and a sinner to relate to and empathize with your child, rather than condemning and punishing them for their sinful worship? Find opportunities to confess your own struggles and sin to them, and invite them into the confession and forgiveness process.
- 3. Consider all the forms of authority that you, as an adult, still need to live under. Do you ever struggle to submit to those sources of authority? When was the last time you rebelled against the authority that God has put over you? Share these struggles with your children.
- 4. When was the last time you exercised authority over your child that did not represent the love of God? What was ruling your heart at that moment? Have you confessed, with specificity, and sought the forgiveness of your child? If not, what is holding you back?
- 5. What authority battles have you been choosing to ignore, allowing your child to develop a delusional sense of self-sovereignty? How will this harm their well-being long term? How is exercising authority actually loving your child, more than giving in to their desires or demands? What can you do to exercise authority firmly, but with patience and love?
- 6. Create a list of practical ways that you can lavish your children with love. In what ways do each of your children have different giftings and preferences, and how can you love them uniquely? What is getting in the way of you spending quality time with your kids and expressing your explicit love for them?

SESSION TWO

Parenting Maturing Children

GOSPEL REMINDERS

- * Not all the wrong things your children do are a direct rebellion against authority; some of those wrong things are the result of a lack of character.
- * The development of character is seldom an event; it's most often a process.
- **x** Your children don't know that they are idolaters, that worship controls their hearts, and that what controls their hearts will shape their words and actions. The job of a parent is to reveal these spiritual mysteries so that the Lord can begin to convict them of their need for help.
- * The details in the Bible are a sure sign of how deep and individual God's love for us is. As parents, be present in the life of your child to know and care about the little details of their lives, even if those details irritate you.

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SESSION TWO

Parenting Maturing Children

KEY VERSE

And he died for all, that those who live might no longer live for themselves but for him who for their sake died and was raised.

2 Corinthians 5:15

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Consider how long it has taken you to develop character. How has change in your heart and life been a process and not an event? Where are you still growing in the fruit of the Spirit? Shouldn't this increase your patience with your children?
- 2. What opportunities for character development do you ignore for the sake of convenience and temporary peace and quiet? How will this harm your children long term? How can you actively look for opportunities to speak about worship and the idols of their heart?
- 3. When was the last time you had an opportunity to engage with your child about their character and worship, but it was conducted too hastily or in anger and impatience? What was controlling your heart during that conversation?
- 4. What are the unique character struggles in each of your children's hearts? How do they sin in different ways? What idols rule their life and threaten their character? Are you investing the time to notice and address each of these separately?
- 5. What is each of your children interested in? Are you aware of their strengths and passions just as much as you are of their weaknesses and sins? How can you enter into their world by showing interest in their interests? Be specific.
- 6. Are you present enough in the lives of each of your children? Review your schedule or calendar. Based on the time you allocate to different activities, what appears to be the most important priority to you? List them in order.
- 7. What practical steps can you take to make your home a refuge of safety and a community of love for your children? Where do you need to sacrifice to accomplish this?

GOSPEL REMINDERS

- * From the earliest days of parenting, you have to think and act bigger than just in the moment—you have to think legacy.
- **x** In parenting, there comes a time for a dramatic transition: moms and dads transition from an authority figure to that of a counselor.
- * There is too much parental pride. Proud people hurt people because proud people think they have arrived and therefore have no problem condemning people who they think haven't arrived.
- **★** Don't underestimate the transformative power of tenderness. You may have the right insight to communicate, but you can't damage the relationship in the process.
- * If the gospel is a generosity story, Christian parents should demonstrate their love for their kids through generosity.

KEY VERSE

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- I. How can you think about your parenting through the lens of legacy? Have you set long-term goals for your children and your relationship with them, long after they have left the home even if they are still young?
- 2. What are some repeated words, actions, or habits that you might have in your relationship with your child that could be causing long-term damage to that relationship? Do you need to seek help from others to change? If you have older children, is your relationship strained because of your sin? How can you confess and reconcile?
- 3. Is pride an obstacle to your parenting? Do you always need to be right? How can you practically practice humility as a mother or father? What can you learn from your child, regardless of their age or stage of life?
- 4. How can you be generous with your child, not necessarily with just financial resources, but also with your time or talent? Where are you selfishly hoarding these for your own pleasure? How can your generosity disciple the next generation to be generous for the Kingdom of God?
- 5. How have you struggled to transition from an authority figure to counselor? Where do you need to hold your tongue and respect the decisions your children make? Are you supportive or judgmental? How can you serve them with no agenda other than to bless them?
